Environmental crime is the fourth largest illicit trade in the world behind narcotics, counterfeit goods, and human trafficking. Wildlife crime impacts livelihoods and security. Our mission is to leverage whistleblower law as a tool to combat wildlife trafficking.

Incentivizing whistleblowers, those with insider knowledge, will revolutionize the detection of wildlife crime, increase effective law enforcement and help combat the global extinction crisis.

Illicit wildlife trafficking is an annual \$69-199 billion business, according to a United Nations Environment Program and INTERPOL Environmental Crime Report. This figure includes illegal trade in fishing and timber.

## How can we work together?




Sharing expertise. We know whistleblower law. Together we can more effectively work to combat wildlife crime.

U.S. citizens, foreign nationals, and NGOs can report wildlife crimes that occur outside of the U.S. and be eligible for rewards under U.S. whistleblower law provisions.

These robust whistleblower reward laws include the False Claims Act, Foreign Corrupt Practices Act, Lacey Act, and Endangered Species Act.
